Beinecke, then President and now the retired Chairman of the Sperry and Hutchinson Company. In 1983, the Prospect Hill Foundation merged with the Frederick W. Beinecke Fund, which had been established by the will of William S. Beinecke's father and was later augmented by the will of Carrie Sperry Beinecke, his mother.

The Prospect Hill Foundation operated under the following guidelines from July 1, 2009 to June 30, 2010. During the 2010 fiscal year, the Foundation underwent a review of all its programs and revised its funding priorities. The new guidelines may be found on page 4. In addition, as a result of this review, the Foundation decided to close its Latin America grants program. Starting July 1, 2010, the Foundation will begin to operate under new guidelines.

From July 1, 2009-June 30, 2010, grants totaling \$2,645,750 were awarded to 85 organizations. In addition, the Foundation's matching gifts program awarded \$263,176 to 180 organizations. As of June 30, 2010, the market value of The Prospect Hill Foundation's assets was approximately \$56,000,000.

In addition, limited support is directed towards environmental conservation and reproductive health projects in northern Guatemala and southern Mexico. REVISED PROGRAM DESCRIPTIONS & GUIDELINES

ENVIRONMENT

The Prospect Hill Foundation's environmental program will target issues related to coastal waters and oceans in the mid-Atlantic and southern New England regions from 2010 to 2014.

JUVENILE JUSTICE

The Prospect Hill Foundation seeks to reform the juvenile justice system in New York. From 2010 to 2015, the Foundation will fund 1) advocacy efforts that promote policies and practices that are fair, effective, and appropriate for youth and 2) capacity building and promotion of community-based alternatives to detention in New York.

NUCLEAR DISARMAMENT & NONPROLIFERATION

The Prospect Hill Foundation seeks to further nuclear arms control and ultimately abolish nuclear weapons through support for policy analysis, research and advocacy. Through 2012, the program will focus its funding on advancing nuclear disarmament, supporting the entry into force of the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty and strengthening the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty regime.

REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH & JUSTICE

The Prospect Hill Foundation seeks to increase access to sexual and reproductive health services by nurturing emerging voices in New York and building the pipeline for reproductive justice leaders in the field. From 2010 to 2011, the Foundation will explore how best to cultivate grassroots leadership in New York and build political power for change in the reproductive health field.

Proposals also should include the following as attachments:

- :: a budget for proposed grant activities (or project budget) for all years covered in the proposal
- :: a budget for the organization for the year(s) covered in the proposal
- :: a list of major foundation and corporate donors
- :: the organization's most recent audited financial statements
- :: biographies of key staff members
- :: a list of the organization's board of directors
- :: the organization's 501(c)(3) IRS determination letter
